**Fat Wages.**—The total amount received by Gales & Seaton, as Printers to Congress, to 1827 inclusive, is \$271,883 37. This does not include the printing of the present Session, which will make the total received and receivable by them on the 1st of July, 1828, at least \$325,000. They received last year upwards of 72,000,—a sum exceeding, by \$7,000 the total expense of printing and stationary of all the branches of the Government, as estimated by a Committee of the H. of Representatives, in 1819, which was computed at \$65,000.—*ib.*

**Episcopal Convention.**—The Convention of the Episcopal Church of the Diocese of North-Carolina met in this town last Thursday, and adjourned on Monday evening. The Bishop, with most of the Clergy, and a due proportion of the Laity attended. There was divine service and a sermon twice a day during the Convention. On Saturday, the rite of Confirmation was conferred, and on Sunday, the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was administered to about 100 recipients. Mr. John Norment, (formerly of this place) was admitted to the order of Deacon, and is, we understand, to perform Missionary duty in Halifax and the parts adjacent.—*Fayetteville Jour.*

**The Season.**—We have been visited by most extraordinary weather, within three weeks past; it has been colder than at any time during the last winter months—on Sunday morning, the 30th ult. (April) a sufficiency of snow fell to whiten the roofs of houses! On Friday morning preceding, thicker ice was perceived than during the winter; and the mercury in the thermometer sunk to 25 degrees, one degree lower than it had previously been the past winter. Fruit, and garden vegetables are almost totally killed; and the growing wheat and rye, particularly that which is the most forward, is partially killed. It was feared the unprecedented mild weather during the winter, would be followed by an unpropitious spring; and the worst of those fears are most fatally realized.—*Salisbury Car.*

**Florida.**—We understand, such is the scarcity of Corn in Florida, that were an equal distribution to take place of the quantity now on hand, there would scarcely be suf-

ficient for one month's consumption. Several of our citizens, who intended visiting that territory, have been prevented on account of the impossibility of procuring provisions there. In Montgomery corn meal is selling for \$1 50, per bushel. In the Indian Nation as we have been informed on respectable authority, travellers have been compelled to pay at the rate of 50 cents per quart, for corn, to feed their horses.
