

native body has power under the Constitution to grant a stay of execution two, four, or six months, which we see they have done, who will dispute their constitutional right to grant a stay for twelve, eighteen, or twenty-four months? No man, I presume. I feel assured that the greater part of the debts now existing in the State, were contracted with an expectation of the creditor as well as debtor, to be discharged with the money or circulating medium of the State—but, alas! contrary to your expectation, because your creditor has got a little crossed with you, he demands specie in payment, and that without giving you notice until the very day on which he intends to sell your property—by this means a vast estate might be swept away to discharge a debt of small amount, and other creditors not get a cent. And now, fellow-citizens, you are called upon seriously to reflect on the situation of a majority of the inhabitants of your state, and after duly weighing the matter to determine, whether it would not be better to compel those who make such unreasonable demands to wait for their money, by extending a stay of execution in such cases; or, whether you would prefer to see your neighbor's property swept away for a mere whistle. It is with you, fellow-citizens, to determine—you can use your constitutional liberties by assembling together, consult your general interest, and instruct your representatives; or, you can stand as idle spectators and see the speculators and foreigners prey upon your neighbor's property, with perhaps as little compassion as the fowls of the air would prey upon a dead carcass—should you prefer the former, you will have a convenient opportunity at your ensuing election, by appointing some suitable persons to ascertain the will of a majority, by taking a vote on the question—by which means your representatives can know the will of a majority of their constituents before the sitting of the next General Assembly.

University.—The Annual Examination of the Students of the University of North-Carolina commenced on the 16th, and closed on the 25th ultimo. On the day following was the Annual Commencement—in the exercises of the forenoon, the Salutory Oration, in Latin, was delivered by *Richard H. Battle*, of Edgecombe—and an Oration on the Objects of Education, by *Henry Toole*, of Tarborough.

The degree of Bachelor of Arts was conferred on eleven young gentlemen, among whom were *Richard H. Battle* and *Henry Toole*, of Edgecombe county.

And the degree of Master of Arts was conferred on seven young men, from different parts of the State.

Alfred Moore, Esq. who was appointed to deliver an Oration on behalf of the Philanthropic Society, was prevented by indisposition from attending.

North-Carolina Notes.—We are glad to find that the credit of our Bank Notes, which, owing to a variety of circumstances, has been rather low for some months past, is decidedly improved and improving, as well at the north as here. They are still, however, at from 7 to 8 per cent. discount there, and 6½ to 7 here, except Cape Fear notes, which are 5 per cent. discount here for U. S. Bank Notes.—*Fayetteville Obs.*

Internal Improvement.—A convention of delegates from all parts of Virginia, is to be held at Charlottesville on the 14th inst. for the purpose of ascertaining public opinion on this subject.

Cotton Canvas.—Capts. *Warrington*, *Woolsey*, and *Wilkinson* of the U. S. Navy—Messrs. *Mezick*, *E. Tyson* and *Wm. Wilson & Sons*, merchants of Baltimore—Capts. *Curtis* and *Bevan*, and five other shipmasters of that city, have given their testimony in favor of Cotton Canvas for the sails of vessels, more especially for the square sails, as cheaper than Russian Duck, in holding the wind better and wearing longer, without being more subject to

the mildew than other duck. The extensive establishment of *Mr. Cook*, in Baltimore, is capable of supplying 200,000 yards annually.

Foreign.—Liverpool papers to the 24th May, have been received at New-York. The political extracts given, relate principally to some recent changes in the British ministry, and conjectures respecting the movements of the Russians and Turks. The Cotton market was brisk, and an advance of 1-3d per lb. had been realized on the lower qualities.
