There were two Reports-one amount. In 1823 the amount of debt from the majority and one from due the Banks, was $\$ 5,583,709$. In the minority of the Committee. They were both read and ordered to be printed, with the whole of the testimony elicited during the investigation. The Committee directed their attention, it seems to several distinct heads of inquiry, of which these were the most prominent:

1. Was the Capital of the sevcral Banks raised in the manner required by their Charters?
2. Have they dealt to a greater amount than allowed by their Charters?
3. Have they dealt in articles prohibited by law?
4. Have they been guilty of Usury?

The report of the majority states, that the State Bank Stock was subscribed and paid in the manner required by the Charter, when the books were first opened in 1810. In 1818, the period of the second subscription, the pay-
ment was not made, it seems, in "gold and silver," but in current Bank Notes. The Capital of the other Banks was paid in the manner required by law
Upon the second head, the Committee report, that all the Banks have dealt to a greater exent than prudence warranted.
On the third point, the Report says, that the State Bank and Sape-fear have both eal to a large amount in United purchased in their own notes at a discount. That all the Banks have given a premium in their own rotes, for those of the Bank of the United States. They state, also, that the State Bank has purchased Cotton to a considerable amount, in this and other States.
On the fourth head, it is stated, hat the State Bank has been in the habit of requiring applicants for accommodation, to exchange Northern funds for their own notes, equal in amount to the sum borrowed.
The Report concludes with a bill, to compel the Banks of this state, to pay specie, after theday of - next, under a penal-
The Report of the Minority, sets out the same facts, in a different dress of course. The maority seems disposed to palliate the conduct of the Banks. The
minority "nothing extenuate," and recommend that the Attorne General of the State, forthwith in stitute proceedings against all of our Banking lustitutions, in th nature of quo warranto.-Reg.
