## Laws of N: Carolina, 1828-9.

 CHAPTER LXV.An Act to incorporate the Edgecombe Manufacturing Company.
$B c$ it enacled by the General Assembly of the State of North-Caroli$n a$, and it is hereby enucted by the authority of the same, That Joel Battle and such other persons as may be associated with him, according to the provisions of the third section of this act, and they are hereby incorporated into body corporate and politic, under the name and style of "the Edgecombe Manufacturing Company," for the purpose of manufacturing cotton, hemp, wool and flax; and $b_{j}$ that name and style may sue and be sued; contract and be contracted with; have perpetual suc-
cession and a common seal; and hold real and personal estate, with the power to make all necessary rules, regulations
and byelaws for the management of the concerns of the company, not inconsistII with the laws of this State.
II. And be it further enacted, That the capital stock of said company shall
not be: less than thirty thousand dollars nor more than one hundred thousand dollars, to be raised by subscription in shares of one hundred dollars each, for which books of subscription shall be opened under the direction of Edmund D. Macnair, David Clark, David Barnes, Joel Battle, Benjamin M. Jackson, Theophilus Parker, Peter Evans and William Plummer, at Tarboro', and at such other places in the State as may by them be deemed advisable; and the said comproceed to organize the said company so proceed the organize the said company
soon as the named sum of thirt soon as the first named sum of thirt
thousand dollars shall have been subscribed for, with leave to the company to extend the capital stook thereof at any time thereafter: Provided, the same
shall not exceed the sum of one hundred shall not exceed the sum of one hundred
tbousand dollars.
