

the poor children of the State. And, Mr. Martin a bill to establish a Bank of and for the benefit of the State.

On the 24th, Mr. Caldwell submitted a resolution, declaring that Congress, under the Constitution, possesses power to make improvements of national concern, and to appropriate the public funds towards the promotion of the general welfare.

On the 23th, Mr. Sherard presented the petition of sundry citizens of the counties of Wayne, Edgecombe, Nash and Johnston, praying for the erection of a new county out of a part of the said counties, to be called Spaight.

On the 30th, Mr. Wilson from the board of commissioners appointed by virtue of an act of Assembly for the representation of the stock of the State in all general meetings of the several Banks in this State, made a detailed report, accompanied by sundry documents.

On the 1st. Dec. Mr. Wilson presented a bill to repeal so much of the act of 1810, as prevents any person from working seines and nets in Tar river above the mouth of Fishing creek.

On the 5th, the amendments to the bill vesting the right of electing Sheriffs in the free white men of the State were agreed to, and the report of the committee of the whole was concurred in.

On the 7th, Mr. Wilson presented the petition of sundry persons, praying the passage of a law prohibiting any person from working seines or skimming with nets, so as to obstruct the passage of fish up Great Contentnea creek, between the hours of 12 o'clock on Saturday and 12 o'clock on Monday of each week. Mr. W. also presented a bill to carry the prayer of the petitioners into effect.

On the 8th, Mr. M'Diarmid presented the petition of sundry citizens of the counties of Cumberland, Wake, Chatham and Moore, praying the erection of a new county, to be called Jackson.

**House of Commons**—On the 20th Nov. Mr. Taylor presented a bill to reduce the salaries of the Judges of the Supreme Court. [Proposes that their salary should not exceed \$2000. The Register states that Mr. Gaston opposed the bill, and delivered one of the most brilliant speeches ever heard in our Legislature, and one which very powerfully affected the House—remarking, in the course of his argument, that this was the last time his voice would be heard in the councils of his country. The bill finally was rejected—ayes 43, noes 32.]

On the 21st, on motion of Mr. Bynum, the committee of Internal Improvement were instructed to inquire what amount of the sum of \$25,000, appropriated by the State for the purpose of locking into the Roanoke river by the canal at Weldon, has been drawn out by the Board of Internal Improvements, and whether or not it has been appropriated to effect that purpose.

On the 24th, on motion of Mr. Enloe, it was resolved that a select committee be appointed to take into consideration the expediency of extending the laws of this State over the Cherokee nation, so far as the chartered limits of North-Carolina extend.

On the 26th, Mr. Nash reported a bill to render void the sale of spiritous liquors by the small measure. And, Mr. Fisher presented a bill to regulate the sale of lands, and to protect from execution a portion of the freehold of the citizens of this State.

On the 28th, Mr. Mebane submitted sundry resolutions, relative to the surplus funds of the General Government, and to internal improvements.

On the 30th, on motion of Mr. Wheeler, the Judiciary committee were instructed to inquire into the expediency of enacting a law which will tend to repress the practice of medicine in this State by incompetent persons.

On the 3d Dec. on motion of Mr. Calloway a select committee was appointed to inquire into the expediency of requesting our Representatives, and instructing our Senators in Congress, to use their exertions to have all the vacant lands of the United States sold as soon as can conveniently be done at a fair price, to be equally apportioned among the different States and Territories for the purpose of education.

On the 7th, the bill to place Quakers, Moravians, Menonists and Dunkards, on an equal footing with other freemen of the State, was indefinitely postponed.

On the 8th, on motion of Mr. Swain it was resolved, that a message be sent to the Senate, proposing that this Legislature adjourn sine die on Saturday, the 26th of December instant.

**U. S. Senator and Governor...**  
Bedford Brown, Esq. of Caswell, was elected Senator in Congress from this State, on the fifteenth ballot, having received 95 votes, and Wm. B. Meares 86.

And, on Wednesday, John Owen, Esq. was re-elected Governor of this State for the ensuing year.
