

Female Classical Seminary,

OXFORD, NORTH-CAROLINA.

THIS Seminary has been removed from Mecklenburg, Va. where it has been in operation for two years past, to this place. The appellation of Classical is adopted, from its being used to designate those Female Academies in which the method of instruction pursued, is the Pestalozzian or Inductive. This plan of instruction is employed here, and extended, as far as practicable into the various branches of study.

The School is arranged in three Classes, the studies of which are as follows:

I. Minor Class-Reading, Writing, Spelling and Defining, General outline of Geography, Mental Arithmetic, First Principles of Grammar and Etymological Parsing, the Composition of Sentences and Simple De-

II. Juniar Class-The three first of the above continued, Geography, Arithmetic continued, Syntactical Parsing, Punctuation, Outline of Astronomy and use of the Globes, Natural Philosophy, History of the United States and Composition.

III. Senior Class-Arithmetic continued, Chemistry, History, Ancient and Modern, Chronology, Mythology, Astronomy, Rhetoric and Composition.

Those who are not prepared to enter the first of these Classes, are retained for a time

an Honorary Class. Instruction is also given in the Languages, Needlework, Drawing and Painting,

and Music. Lectures are delivered to the Senior Class, on Mineralogy, Botany, and Mental and Moral Philosophy. The School is furnished with a considerable collection of Minerals and Botanical Collection, and with Apparatus for performing experiments in Natural

Philosophy and Chemistry.

The branches mentioned in the List of Studies are taught by Mr. and Mrs. HOL-THE Subscriber has just received the following late publications, viz:

LISTER, to be assisted by such other teachers as the number of pupils may require. The Lectures and Instruction in Latin and French, are given by Mr. Hollis-ter. Plain and ornamental Needlework, Drawing in Perspective, Painting in water colors, including Landscapes, and Painting on velvet, are taught by Mrs. Hollister.

The Department of Music is under the direction of Miss E. F. Humphreys, who has the Post-Office in Tarborough. maintained a high reputation for the two the Music Department in the celebrated Moravian School at Bethlehem, Pa. Two Pianes are provided for the use of the pu-pils in Music, one of which is a superior in-

Parents who wish to place their daugh ters at School, where the course of instruction is liberal and calculated to discipline and enlarge the mind, while at the same time, the ornamental branches of female education may be attended to under the most favorable circumstances, will, it is be-lieved, do well to place them here. The situation is pleasant and healthy, and the accommodations spacious and comfortable. A parental care is exercised over the pupils, who reside with the instructors, and plans employed for encouraging the improvement of time and the practice of amiable manners, which are peculiarly powerful in their influence.

The Scholastic year is divided into two sessions of five months each, the first commencing on the second Monday in January, and ending early in June, when the second form with a handsome border, the session commences and continues until about the middle of November.

The terms for Board and Tuition in the branches mentioned in the list of studies, are \$55 per session; Music \$25; Drawing and Painting \$10; French or Latin \$10, payable in advance. No other extra charges are made. Books and Stationary are furnished, if desired, at the Richmond prices. Scholars are received at any time, and charged only from the time of their entrance.

FEES OF THE CLERKS

Of the County and Superior Courts, and of the Sheriffs, of North-Carolina, as fixed by Act of General Assembly, session of 1829-30.

Price 25 cents each.—The following paragraph is extracted from the above act:

"XV. And be it further enacted, That it shall be the duty of the Clerks of the County and Superior Courts to keep a copy of this act posted up in their respective offi-ces, and in the Court-house, in some conspicuous place during the sitting of each Court, under a penalty of fifty dollars, to be recovered before any justice of the peace by any person suing for the same."
