

Mr. R. continued his survey of the Central Road westward, the estimate would have been still higher.

We fear that if the Central Rail road cannot be accomplished at a much less sum than Mr. Rawle's estimate, it will not, at present, be effected.—*ib.*

It will be seen, on reference to the Senate proceedings, that the Resolutions reported by Judge Toomer, on the subject of the controversy between South Carolina and the General Government, have been adopted in that branch, by an overwhelming majority. Their passage by as decided a vote in the House of Commons, is equally certain. They were discussed at great length on Wednesday, but the question on their passage was not taken, in consequence of the wish expressed by several gentlemen to deliver their views on the subject. The entire debate so far, has been elicited on that particular Resolution which denounces the doctrine of Nullification as tending directly to a dissolution of the Union.

This having been read, Mr. Potts rose in its support, and spoke for a considerable time with great force and eloquence, in which he exposed in vivid colors the absurdity of the doctrine. He was replied to by Mr. Sawyer, of Edenton, who took a wide range, in which he endeavored to show that Nullification, as avowed by South Carolina, is essentially the same doctrine as is inculcated in the Virginia and Kentucky Resolutions, and was acted upon by Virginia. Mr. Bragg took the floor next, in reply to Mr. Sawyer, and in favor of the resolution. When he concluded, after numerous ineffectual efforts, the House, on motion of Mr. Eccles, adjourned about 4 o'clock.—*ib.*

We learn from the Raleigh papers, that on Monday of last week, after 12 ballottings continued for nearly a week, Joseph John Daniel, one of the Judges of our Superior Courts of Law and Equity, was elected to fill the vacancy occasioned on the Supreme Court Bench, by the resignation of Judge Hall. On the first ballot, John D. Toomer received 63 votes, Henry Seawell 46, J. J. Daniel 44, Frederick Nash 9, Robert Strange 3, scattering 12. After the 2d balloting, Nash and Strange were withdrawn. On the 7th ballot, Geo. E. Badger was added, and the vote stood, for Toomer 72, Daniel 59, Seawell 30, Badger 20, scattering 3—Badger was then withdrawn. After the 9th ballot Seawell was withdrawn. On the 12th and last ballot, Daniel received 95 votes. Toomer 83, scattering 6.

On Wednesday, two ineffectual ballottings took place for a Judge of the Superior Courts, in the place of Judge Daniel. On the first ballot, Henry Seawell received 53 votes, Richmond Pearson 32, John D. Eccles 32, James S. Jones 21, Spencer O'Brien 15, scattering 14. On the 2d ballot, Seawell 65, Eccles 33, Pearson 27, O'Brien 22, Jones 15, scattering 3.

On the same day, Daniel M. Barringer, Charles L. Hinton and Daniel W. Courts, Esqrs. were elected Trustees of the University, to supply vacancies in the Board. State of the balloting—Barringer 117, Hinton 110, Courts 89, H. McQueen 82, T. Sumner 53, scattering 10.

James Wyche has been re-elected Superintendent of Public Works, for the ensuing year, without opposition.

Raleigh, Jan. 4.—On Friday evening, an entertainment was given at Mr. Rigbee's Hotel, by the citizens of this city, to the Members of the Legislature; which was attended by between three and four hundred ladies and gentlemen. The supper table was plentifully and tastefully furnished, and every arrangement had been made which could conduce to the pleasure and comfort of the large company assembled on the occasion. The ball room especially attracted attention, and called forth the universal admiration of the spectators. It was handsomely decorated with flags, paintings and transparencies, executed by Mr. Alfred Waugh, miniature painter, of this place. At the west end of the hall was a brilliant transparency representing our State Capitol as it stood previous to its destruction, with the American Eagle hovering over its dome, bearing in its beak a scroll with an

inscription in these words: "The Legislature of 1832." At the opposite end was another, emblematic of the three grand divisions of the continent—earth, wood and water—in which appeared the standard of the Union, planted on a rock, with the following inscription near the foot of its staff: "Our country, our whole country, and nothing but our country." The sides of the room were also ornamented with elegant transparencies, devices and heraldic designs, too numerous to designate. Suffice it to say, that the arrangements were such as to give universal satisfaction.—*Star.*
