The Portsmouth Journal gives the following history of this lady as a specimen of Yankee female enterprise:

"Several years since this very respectable young lady, who was in a state of 'single blessedness,' opened a milliner's shop and fancy good store in this town. She prosecuted her business with success for some time, and made considerable money; but at length there was a severe depression in the various departments of trade among our citizens, and the milliner suffered in common with her neighbors, although her complaints at this decline of business were by no means so loud as theirs. She had a large stock of goods, on hand, for such an establishment, and not few of them had become shop worn and rusty. As for staying in this dull town any longer where there was no prospect either for marriage or money she said she could not. So she settled up her affairs as fast as she could, with a determination to seek her fortune somewhere else. She packed up her stock of goods, which amounted to between two and three thousand dollars and shipped them to East Florida, where she went herself also. In a few months she wrote back tidings to her friends in Portsmouth, stating that she had a prosperous journey, had opened shop, found business brisk, and had sold merchandise at profit of fifty per cent. She has resided in Florida two or three years—has been fortunate in all her speculations in buying and selling English and American dry goods—enjoyed fine health, and made a great many acquaintances and friends. Last and best of all, she has got married to a very wealthy widower, and writes back word, that Florida is the place for her. She says also, that there are other chances in Florida nearly as good as her's."

Onondaga and Seneca Indians.—A proposition was lately made by the Government to the remnants of these to accept of certain lands at Green Bay in exchange for their possessions in New York. This they refused at a recent meeting held at the Council House at Buffalo creek. The following are the resolutions passed on that occasion.—They are signed by 50 of the Chiefs and head men of the tribes:

Resolved. That we, the chiefs and head men of the Seneca and Onondaga nations of Indians, are now possessed of lands within this state amply sufficient for ourselves and our children, and that we have no inclination whatever to remove therefrom.

Resolved. That we will not accept the proposition made to us by the Secretary of War, through our agent, to appoint a delegation to witness a survey of lands at Green Bay, nor will we in any wise interest ourselves concerning said proposition.

Penalty for Detaining Letters.—A verdict was rendered last week against a post master in Waldon county, Me., for withholding a letter addressed to the plaintiff—the latter having instituted a suit therefore in the Supreme Court, and claiming damages for the detention. He recovered \$530 for the "omission" by a clerk in the office, to deliver the letter, when called for.

The Mormons.—A correspondent of the New York Journal of Commerce, writes as follows under date—Lexington, Missouri, July 25, 1833:—

"You have probably heard of the Mormon establishment in this vicinity. Six hundred, or more, of that misguided people, have emigrated, within the last two years to Jackson City in the next county to this, and have rendered themselves obnoxious to the citizens by holding out inducements for free negroes to settle in the county, and urging slaves to be unfaithful. Last week the citizens organ-

ized themselves for the purpose of breaking up the establishment. Their (the Mormonite) printing press was thrown down,—store and machine shop broken up,—the leaders tarred and feathered, and a time set for their departure. What course may be pursued towards the followers, is not yet known.

Balloons.—Mr. Durant, the celebrated Aeronaut, made his seventh ascension on Thursday week at Albany, New York. The ascent is stated to have been made in his best style, and that every thing conspired to render it gratifying to the immense concourse of spectators (nearly 4000) who had assembled to witness it.

The Rev. J. GORNTO is expected to preach in the Old Church at Tarborough, on Thursday after the fourth Lord's day in August.—Com.

Building a Court House,

IN THE TOWN OF GREENVILLE,

The plan of which to be as follows:
The Building to be of brick, 52 feet long by 40 wide, two stories high, fire-proof. The foundation of the walls to be based on clay, and the walls as thick as usual for buildings of similar size and description, and to be anchored.

The first story to be 10, and the second story 13 feet pitch, and the first floor 2 1/2 feet above the surface.

The roof to be quadragon and covered either with zinc, tin, or slate. Applicants to state the terms for each.

The lower story to contain in the sides and ends 16 windows, and the upper story 18 windows; each to contain 18 panes glass 10 by 12.

Two doors in the lower story with a passage to run across the width, embracing one-third the length of the building; with two rooms on one side, and two rooms and a stair case on the other. The upper story to contain the Court room and in one end two Jury rooms.

All the partitions to be of brick and to be based like the exterior walls. Four chimneys to be attached at proper places with four fire places below. The sills and caps of doors and windows to be of stone. The windows to have catches and bolts, with shutters closing on the out side. The style and finish of the Court room is reserved for future and special contract.

The foregoing is a general plan of the building which will be adhered to, but the Commissioners may see cause to alter or modify it in some of the particulars before closing the contract. If desired by the Contractor, half the amount of the contract price and perhaps more, will be paid in advance, and the balance in one year.
