# FOREIGN.

PWe have no later intelligence from Europe-we have, however, gleaned the following items from our late papers.

Don Pedro, by last accounts from Portugal, had been successful in an action with the Miguelites, having captured 700 men during the skirmish.

It is quite certain that the aftered tone of Russia, produced, as it is said, by the representations of Austria, (this is very easily understood,) have induced the English and French governments to withdraw their fleets from the east of the Mediterranean. No preparations are wanting, however, to keep them in a state of efficiency and readiness for action. The dispute is postponed, not se tled.

On Monday, Feb. Sd, Marshal Soult came down to the French Chamber of Deputies, and, retracting all he had promised in the way of military reductions, increased his demand to the original amount of 371,000 men, and 78,230 horses. This, of course, excited considerable sensation in the Chamber, which was by no means diminished when the minister of marine shortly afterwards asked for an extraordinary grant of 2.800,000 francs for increasing the naval force in the Mediterranean. Demands like these are strangely at variance with the pacific tenor of the French King's speech on opening the Chambers.

A French regiment of chasseurs having been ambuscaded outside the fortress at Oran, by about 1000 Arab horsemen, stopped and is believed to be of no value. on the 6th January, were completely routed and nearly cut to pieces. Twen-

ty-three of the French cavalry, who had wen made prisoners, were found afterwards on the ground, stripped and perfectly naked, their heads decapitated, and their hands and feet amputated.

King William, of Holland, is said to be a bankrupt, and that his goods and chattles have been sold to meet the demands of his creditors-and that they would not respect his protest claiming that his wines should be exempt from sequestration. Few acts that the sovereign could commit would be more likely to render him unpopular in Holland, than bank-

Antigua .- An act has been passed by the Legislature of Antigua abolishing slavery in that island, after the 1st day of August next. In November last, the Governor, at the request of the Legislature, addressed the British government for information, whether unconditional abolition would be permitted, in lieu of the gradual system provided by the act of Parliament. A reply was received stating that the wishes of the Legislature were entirely in accordance with the views of the Government and the spirit of the act of Parliament. The act of total and unconditional abolition was accordingly passed by the Assembly on the 13th of Feb. and the Council on the 15th.

South America .- A Philadelphia paper contains the interesting intelligence, received by the Emperor from Laguayra, that the fourth Constitutional Congress of Venezuela had met at Carraccas, and passed on the 10th Feb. a decree by nearly an unanimous vote, which was afterwards ratified by the Executive, declaring that religion is an essential part of Culpepper John Revd civil liberty, and that "The liberty of public worship is not prohibited in the Republic Venezuela?' A reform in the judicial system of the country is about to take place, and trial by jury established.
