WASHINGTON LETTER
(From our regular Correspondent.)
May 6th, 1901

Ever since Admiral Dewey predicted that the next war the U. S. had would be with Germany, there have been periodical stories alleging an intention on the part of Germany to provoke a war with us. Just now, the latest is being discussed. It started in Berlin, its foundation being a published interview purporting to have been given out by high German officials which, in speaking of the rapid growth of German interests in South and Central America, markedly ignores the Monroe doctrine. That interview has aroused considerable interest in Washington, largely in official circles. As all the world knows, the Emperor of Germany is desirous of greatly strengthening his Navy, he wishes Germany to become a great sea power—and while he has partially succeeded and is now constructing a fleet of warships that will make his navy about as strong as ours, he wants more money for naval purposes, and is desirous of influencing public opinion in Germany in that direction. For that reason, warlike talk in the German press is not very seriously considered in Washington. But one thing may be set down as certain. If Germany, or any other power thinks the U. S. will not fight to maintain the Monroe doctrine, they will make a costly mistake.

The Interstate Commerce Commission rendered a decision that is highly important both to railroads and shippers, when it construed the law, which a New York concern sought to show was intended to put all receivers of freight in carloads on the same footing, that a rail road company is not in every case under legal compulsion to furnish the same terminal facilities, for all descriptions of traffic. If that construction stands, it will place a powerful weapon in the hands of such railroads as may desire to discriminate against any of its patrons.

A domestic problem, which War Department officials will try to solve before Congress meets, is now to make the National Guard of the several states a working auxiliary of the regular army in time of war, in such a way that the cumbersome red tape method, followed when the members of the National Guard became U. S. Volunteers for the war with Spain, may be avoided without offending the principles or prejudices of those who sticklers for the rights of the states in all dealings with the Federal Government. It is not an easy task, but those who are charged with the duty of considering it, are hopeful of success. All those interested will have ample opportunity to be heard before any plan is settled upon by the War Department, as it is the desire of the department that a plan be reported to Congress which will arouse no serious opposition.

It is already quite certain that a tariff war will be fought in Congress next winter, unless something occurs to distract public attention from the question. The agitation started by Representative Babcock, of Wis., when he introduced the bill to remove the duty from all products of the big steel trust, has

grown steadily, and Mr. Babcock says that the incident has been so widely endorsed that he intends to broaden it by introducing a bill as soon as Congress meets, providing for the repeal of the duty on all trust controlled products. While Mr. Babcock would prefer that this war be confined to the republican party in Congress, it is obvious that it will not be. The democrats have already noted the advantage they think they can gain for their party by supporting Mr. Babcock's idea, and they will probably attempt to carry it over further. On the other hand, the more conservative republicans are likely to be found opposing the bill, not so much because they are against its provisions, as because they regard it as an attack upon the protection principle, which they claim to be the keystone of success of their party as well as of the country's prosperity, which they cannot safely encourage. The attitude of the people will probably decide the result of the fight. On general principles, regardless of party, the people are overwhelmingly in favor of legislation that will curb the power of the trusts. This Mr. Babcock claims his bill will do. The arguments presented by the supporters and opponents of the bill will be the determining factor of the attitude of the people.

Speaking of the privilege of franking mail matter, an official called attention to the not generally known fact that two women have the privilege of sending any mail matter through the U. S. mails free; also that any mail matter addressed to either of them will be carried free. These two women are Mrs. D. Grant and Mrs. Lucretia R. Garfield.

Mr. Montagu White, the Boer diplomatic agent, who has been in Washington a week, has announced that Oom Paul Kruger will visit this country in October.

J. S. Mann, of Hyde county, has been elected Superintendent of the State penitentiary.
