MARVELOUS RAILWAY SPEED.

Now that parliament has consented to a franchise for the Behr monorailroad, to be worked by electricity between Manchester and Liverpool, the world will have an opportunity of seeing what can be done in fast speeds. There is a short overhead one rail road in Germany, which is operated with some success, but the English call for speeds ranging from 100 to 150 miles an hour. This looks fast for the mother country. Yet it will not do to say that 150 miles an hour is impracticable. Reputable engineers testified before a committee of Parliament in of the scheme. We are now familiar with speeds of 60 and 80 miles an hour, though 30 miles was formerly deemed impracticable. An unobstructed overhead train has a fairer chance to realize high speeds than has a heavy surface train. -Baltimore Sun.
