THE MODEL STREET.

One of the Unique Exhibits of the St. Louis Exposition. Members of village improvement societies will go to the St. Louis exposition and all who are interested in town betterment should spend some time at the exhibit of a model street, as many valuable pointers can be gained. It serves an admirable purpose by illustrating to visitors the ways and means by which a small town may be beautified and improved. As an aid to the proper direction of municipal effort it is thorough and complete.

The street is located back of the Manufacturers building and immediately adjacent to the Lindell boulevard entrance. It is 1,200 feet long, approximately four city blocks, and is forty-two feet wide, with grass lawns on either side between the roadway and sidewalks. The pavement, parking and other equipment of the street are according to the latest and most improved methods and form part of the exhibit, so that the municipal authorities of any town need not go on a junketing tour around the country in search of information, but will find everything they may desire on the street and with experts to explain the utilities shown.

The best method of installing sanitary sewers, storm sewers, gas pipes, domestic and fire water pipes, electric conduits and so forth may be ascertained, and the paving of the roadway is divided into several sections, one showing asphalt treatment for streets, another vitrified brick and so forth. Even many different methods of curbing have been employed. The paving and curbing placed in close conjunction after this manner will enable one to judge their value by the simple method of direct comparison.

There is also an exhaustive display of standard new street fixtures, lamp posts, fire plugs, kiosks and drinking fountains, and from time to time a septic tank, street cleaning and so forth will be exhibited in operation along the roadway. The exhibit is practical in every respect, and, as it comprises all the latest and best ideas of municipal economy, that it will be of the greatest value to municipal councils and boards in search of ideas for street and park improvements for streets. A feature of the display will be that showing methods for planting trees along city streets, with special reference to providing a sufficient amount of air and water around the roots, a simple matter, but one often neglected when towns attempt a beautifying of their thoroughfares. The buildings fronting on the street include several erected especially by American cities for the installation of their exhibits, a model town hall, model casino, hospital, library building, school, municipal museum and a railway station.

TRADE AT HOME.

Every Citizen Should Patronize Local Merchants and Mechanics. The ideal community is that in which there is a reciprocity of good feeling among merchants in all branches of trade, mechanics, professional men, workmen and farmers, each availing himself as far as possible of the other's services, laying his goods or employing his labor, as the case may be. The community where this practice obtains is always found to be an exceptionally prosperous one, populated by cheerful, honest, neighborly and enterprising people, and a good place for the home secker to locate in.

The member of a community who habitually ignores his home merchant, mechanic or tradesman and makes his purchases and spends his money in other towns does not deserve the name of a good citizen and should not be commended by those who have the best interests of their own locality at heart. That it pays to trade near home is a well established fact, and no town or city ever prospered whose citizens, enticed by the alluring baits held out by the merchant in the big cities, spend their money with them.

The local merchant and mechanic are interested in the progress and development of the town and country in which they live, and every dollar that they amass is reinvested and remains in the neighborhood. As they prosper their taxes increase, and just so much those of others are lightened. They assist in keeping up their schools, churches and other public institutions and charities. But the person who spends his money in some distant city puts it beyond assisting in any local enterprise.

Back Yard Embellishments. The plan recently adopted by a village improvement society in a Maryland town of offering prizes for back yard gardens is bringing good results and may offer a suggestion to other communities where the back yards spoil the beauty of the place and are too often dumping places for the reception of endless varieties of useless truck cast off from the daily operation of house cleaning. With a little work and by planting a few seeds the meanest looking back yard in the country could be transformed into a garden spot in a short time and be a credit to the town in which it is located. To work in the yard is a beautiful exercise and would save enough in doctor and medicine bills to pay for the plans, leaving the garden itself in the end clear profit. By all means let us have the garden contest, and let everybody enter.

Analyze the Drinking Water. One well in a Missouri village at which four different families got their water was found to be responsible for seven deaths and five cases of severe sickness in six years. When the water supply of a town is taken from open wells the water should be analyzed at least once a year.

How to Roll Sponge Jelly Cake. Remove the cake from the tin as soon as done, lay it on a cloth wrung out in warm water and spread it with jelly, and roll at once.

How to Darken the Hair. For hair that is becoming faded pour two quarts of freshly boiling water on two ounces of green tea and two ounces of sage leaves, then boil till the quantity is reduced by one-half. Strain, bottle and apply to the hair every night.

CLEANING KALAMAZOO.

Women Improving and Beautifying a Michigan Town. The women of the Civic League of Kalamazoo, Mich., are doing much to improve and beautify their town. Recently one of the most active members of the league, Mrs. Crane, visited all the merchants and got them to promise to sweep their walks regularly and to scrub them off at stated periods.

She had a photographer make a tour, taking snapshots of alleys and the back yards of private residences. These pictures she has numbered and recorded like legal exhibits, and they will be used to bring about a reform. Regarding this feature Mrs. Crane says: "We do not wish to attract attention in this way or create the impression that we believe Kalamazoo to be worse than other towns."

"The photographs taken are not publicly displayed, but are simply used in presenting to the proper persons the conditions which exist. In many cases the persons concerned have not noticed or realized the conditions which exist and have been glad that we called the matter to their attention."

"House cleaning is woman's natural duty, and the cleaning of a town is but a larger view of the same proposition."

Mrs. Crane has carried a little satchel with her containing printed slips, which she has frequently given to passing citizens. These slips read:

PLEASE!

The Woman's Civic Improvement League has undertaken to keep Main street clean. We ask YOU to help us. Please do not throw anything—paper, fruit skins and other litter—in the street, put it in the waste paper can on the corner. And gentlemen, please do not spit on the sidewalk, or in the gratings, or anywhere but in the gutter. Now please don't throw this in the street!

As an object lesson the league recently agreed to clean the streets in the business section of the town, and the results of their work so far achieved are encouraging. They expect to prove they can do the work better and with greater economy than has yet been the case in any American city. From the start Mrs. Crane made arrangements to have the refuse collected from the streets carried away at no expense, and she stated that she expected to make this item a source of profit after the first week. A farmer engaged in growing celery has carried away the refuse, using it as fertilizer. But Mrs. Crane would not make a contract with him for longer than one week. It is believed this is the first place in the United States where the dirt from the streets has been taken away without expense to the city.

Judicial leagues are being organized among the children, who will exert their influence to have the streets kept clean and beautify the town. "I tell the children," said Mrs. Crane, "that few of us are privileged to give ourselves to our country nowadays, but that we may all be patriots of our town, doing what we can to make it beautiful and healthful."

WINDOW BOXES.

They Beautify Residence and Street. How to Make Them.

One of the best ways to beautify a residence and a street as well as by means of window boxes with growing flowers, and the plan is being adopted in many cities and towns this year. In a Massachusetts town recently the village improvement society induced the residents of an entire street to beautify their residences in this way, and it has resulted in one of the prettiest streets in the state.

Any one can make these window boxes at home with very little trouble, says a writer in the New York American. Buy planed half inch boards of the right length, with pieces for the ends about eight inches wide. Nail the front boards over the sides of the side pieces unless the boxes are intended at the corners, which would make them more expensive by requiring the services of a carpenter. When the boards are neatly nailed together tack narrow molding along the edges and over the corners to give them a finished appearance. Then paint the boxes the color of the trimmings of the windows. Secure them with iron brackets and fill them first with one inch of broken ash coal and then well prepared earth. Bore three small holes in each box for drainage.

It is fascinating to see a brilliant array of flowers above the sill in a window and refreshing to smell the sweet odor of mignonette and other old fashioned posies.
