DEAR SIR:—The sample of Drinking Water sent to the State Chemist for analysis in a Bottle, contains:

Total solid matter in solution and suspension,	29.2	grs. per U. S. Gal.
Hardness,	1.4	degrees Clark's Scale
Equivalent to calcium carbonate,	0.7	grs. per U. S. Gal.
Chlorine,	1.79	grs. per U. S. Gal.
Free Ammonia,	0.296	parts per million
Albuminoid Ammonia,	0.055	parts per million
Nitrogen as Nitrates,	0.05	parts per million

REMARKS:

The free ammonia is rather too high in this water. But assuming that no surface water can (or does) get into the well (for example, through cleavage or fracture cracks in the rock in which the well may possibly be bored), the water may be regarded as a safe drinking water.
