Death of James Thomas Lanier

James Thomas Lanier was born February 22, 1880, and died at the home of his brother, Mr. R. H. Lanier at Everetts, N. C., December 31, 1907 at 2:30 a. m., after an illness of six weeks. He was placed away beside his mother in the family burying ground at the old home-stead. He was all of his life a good christian-hearted man.

After the death of his father the family broke up and scattered about. He lived with his brother R. H. Lanier of Everetts most of his time, until he was the age of 18 years, then he began to learn telegraphy and the railroad business, with the A. C. L. R. R. Co. This he kept up until he reached the age of 21. Then he went to Richmond, Va., to Massey's Business College. He finished up his studies in October of the same year, then went to Raleigh, N. C., and accepted a position with the S. A. L. R. R. Co. He soon removed to Wilmington, N. C., and on February 18, 1903, he married Miss Annie May Sasser, a charming lady of that city. While living there he united with the Presbyterian church. He gained many friends wherever he went and was loved by all who knew him.

His health has been failing for the past two years. Last July he went out in the far West to try to regain his health, but kept on growing weaker until he had to give up his work. He came to Southern Pines, N. C., on the 16 of November to be treated by Dr. Edwin Gladman for tuberculosis of the throat. After staying three weeks Dr. Gladman found there was no possible chance for him to recover. His brothers were notified of his condition, and he was taken to the home of his brother R. H. Lanier, at Everetts. He lived three weeks after he was taken to his brother's home. His mother in law, Mrs. O. C. Sasser, of Bowden, N. C., was sent for to nurse and assist in waiting on him. Everything that kind hearts and willing hands could do was done for him. The good Lord who doeth all things to His will, saw fit to take him from this world to a brighter world above. The day before he died he told his loved ones standing around his bedside he would soon be over, he would be at rest.

He leaves his wife four brothers and one sister surviving him. May God in His mercy comfort the bereaved and sanctify our afflictions to the good of our souls. Till we are called to follow him, and in the grave to sleep. "We shall sleep but not forever." There will be a glorious dawn. We shall meet to part no never. On the resurrection morn."

Proclamation by the Governor

To the Honorable the General Assembly of North Carolina: By and with the advice of the Council of State, and the attorneys employed to represent the State of North Carolina.

I, R. B. Glenn, Governor of the State of North Carolina, in the exercise of the powers conferred upon me of Article Three, Section Nine, of the Constitution, do issue this my proclamation, convening the General Assembly, in extra session on Tuesday, the 21st day of January, 1908, on which day, at 11 o'clock a. m., the senators and members of the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of North Carolina are hereby notified and requested to meet in their respective Halls in the Capitol, in the City of Raleigh, to consider the following specific purpose:

1st. To amend, modify strengthen, change or repeal Chapter 216, Laws of 1907, prescribing the maximum charges railroad companies may make for transporting passengers in North Carolina, and Chapter 217, Laws 1907, preventing unjust discriminations in freight rates, and to fix the maximum charges therefor.

For information of members of the Legislature, all papers are requested to make notice of this proclamation.

In witness whereof, I, R. B. Glenn, Governor and Commander in Chief, have hereunto set my hand and caused to be affixed the Great Seal of the State. Done at our City of Raleigh, this 8th day of January, 1908, and in the one hundred and thirty-second year of our American Independence.
