MCLAWHORNE MYS-TERY SOLVED.

Was not Murder, but Carefully and Deliberately Planned Suicide.

The mystery surrounding the shooting of Elias B. McLawhorne has at last been solved. Mr. J. J. Stroud, one of the contractors working on the City Hall brought the information to Sheriff Crawford and Chief of Police Page this week from Mr. Joe McLawhorne, brother of the deceased. The message sent to the officers was in substance as follows: that the officers here need not worry any more about the af fair, as he, (Mr. Joe McLawhorne) was satisfied that it was a case of suicide, having seen the letter written by the deceased the night of the shooting. That the letter was written to Mrs. McLawhorne and told her about the plan and why he was going to shoot himself.

This information clears up dark mystery and removes every suspicion as to the perpetrator of the crime.

The officers here have written to Mr. Joe McLawhorne for the letter, but have not yet heard from him. The letter when received will be published, as in justice to the cit-
