GREAT PROHIBITION MEETING

The Court House Crowded to Hear Governor Glenn—Good Music and Singing

The Court House was crowded last night to hear the prohibition speech of Gov. R. B. Glenn. People were here from all sections of the county.

The meeting last night was opened with "Carolina" led by the children of the Graded School, this was followed by prayer by the Rev. C. L. Read of the Methodist Church, after which a temperance song was sung.

Mr. W. C. Manning, Chairman of the Anti-Saloon League Executive Committee, in a short but appropriate speech introduced the Governor.

For an hour and a half the Governor held the closest attention of the large audience, and pleaded with them to stand by the girls and boys of the 'grand old North State.'

When the train arrived yesterday evening the Governor was met at the depot by the Williamston Brass Band, two white floats carrying Williamston's fairest jewels, and hundreds of the citizens of the town and county.

After leaving the residence of Col. Lamb the floats were driven through the town, the young ladies and little girls singing temperance songs. When the float carrying the larger girls was opposite Mr. John D. Simpson's, one of the standards gave way and all the young ladies except two were thrown to the street.

The young ladies are doing very well this morning and it is hoped that they will soon be able to be out again.

Prohibition Day at Holly Springs

Announcement was made that on the afternoon of the 4th Sunday in April there would be held in Holly Springs Church a meeting in the interest of prohibition.

The atmosphere was charged with enthusiasm, of expectation, of genuine interest.

At a few minutes past three o'clock the choir sang "America," the congregation joining in, in good earnest.

Mr. Charlie Daniels made the opening address showing the blighting, baneful, retarding effects of the saloon, and setting forth in a splendid way the improved condition that prohibition would produce.

To Mrs. J. B. Hardison and Mrs. Ed Daniel is largely due the credit for the work done in this cause; though when asked who had assisted, Mrs. Hardison replied that they all showed great interest in it.

At the conclusion of this program Messrs. W. C. Manning, Walter Anderson and W. A. Ellison made effective short speeches.

All who favored voting out the saloons on May 26 were asked to stand, and the entire congregation with the exception of a dozen perhaps stood up.

The meeting was large and enthusiastic. If the rest of the county does as well by the prohibition cause as the community about Holly Springs will do Martin County will be a banner county on the dry list by an overwhelming majority.

McLAWHORNE MYSTERY SOLVED.

Was not Murder, but Carefully and Deliberately Planned Suicide.

The mystery surrounding the shooting of Elias B. McLawhorne has at last been solved. Mr. J. J. Stroud, one of the contractors working on the City Hall brought the information to Sheriff Crawford and Chief of Police Page this week from Mr. Joe McLawhorne, brother of the deceased.

This information clears up a dark mystery and removes every suspicion as to the perpetrator of the crime. The officers here have written to Mr. Joe McLawhorne for the letter, but have not yet heard from him.

Several of our citizens have always held to the suicide theory, but the evidence before the Coroner's Jury was to the contrary.

The family knew at the time of Mr. McLawhorne's death that it was suicide, and should have said so then, instead of leading the people to believe it was murder and putting the officers to the unnecessary expense they had in trying to find the supposed murderer.
