

PRACTICAL POULTRY COLUMN.

Mr. Editor:-

As the Christmas festivities are drawing near, it calls to my mind my boyhood days some 30 years ago, when mother always instructed me to get the turkeys fat and ready for the market. I wish to say a few words about the different breeds of the majestic fowl. In olden days, the only season that there was any demand for the fowls was at Xmas. Now there is a demand for them at all seasons. "The pig of the poultry yard" brings delight to every guest at all feasts.

There are six standard varieties grown in this country, viz: Bronze Naragansett, Buff, Slate, White and Black. The principle difference is in the size and color of plumage.—the Bronze and the Naragansett are the largest, the Buff and Slate the medium, the Black and White the smallest. There has been so much improvement in the White that they are contending for another position as to weight, some of them having passed the 30 lb. mark. I raised the Naragansett breed for a number of years; the standard weight of this variety is from 20 to 30 lbs for the males. It is not unusual for the male to weigh over 40 lbs., being too heavy for the ordinary market. They are great foragers, very often wandering to such a distance that they would not return at night. Since then, I have raised

non-standard breeds and have found them as difficult to manage. They are always so fond of my neighbors oat patch and field peas. In April, 1907, I concluded to try the white turkey. In America the white variety is called the White Holland in the English poultry books, they are referred to as Austrian Whites in some Egyptian countries as the sacred turkey. They have been known in England for over one hundred years, but are a comparatively new breed in this country. It is considered the ideal fowl for a person with a limited range, for it bears confinement well. I cannot say this for any other breed. They show a vitality equal to other varieties and are no more difficult to raise. This year I raised every one that I had hatched, and with less trouble. The usual weight of these fowls for the hens, is from 10 to 14 lbs. for the males, from 15 to 26 lbs. according to the age. In color of plumage, they are pure snow white, except each has a black beard, the toes and shanks being a pinkish white. From experience, I know that one cannot select a better breed than the White Holland. They grow to the most profitable size for the table, and when dressed correctly, present an attractive appearance to the buyer.

I wish for you and all the readers of THE ENTERPRISE A MERRY CHRISTMAS, with a nice, fat turkey for your dinner.
