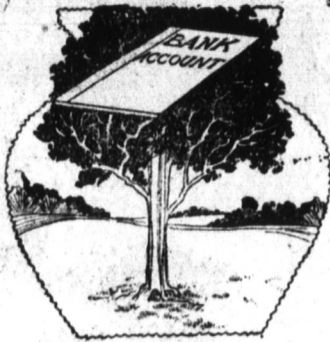

Dr. Delia Dixon-Carroll was called from Raleigh in consultation with Dr. W. E. Warren over the little son of Mr. S. J. Everett.

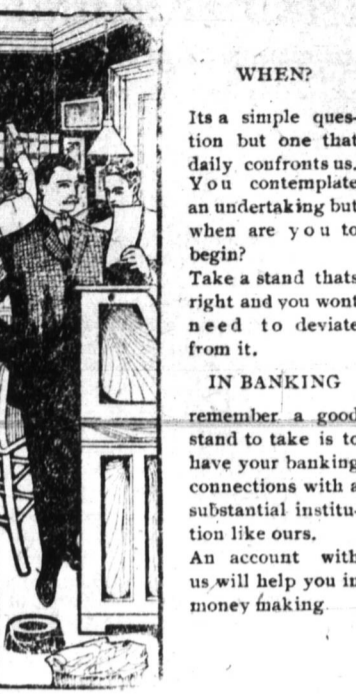
