**Care with Peanuts**

The greatest crop which Martin County produces is its peanut crop. The soil can and does grow the succulent nut to perfection and our farmers many of them, are pioneers in the growth of the nut. This year the crop is generally good, but not as great as that of last year. There were so many in some lands last season that even the hogs failed to get them out.

The time for harvesting is near at hand, and to insure the best results, the farmer should exercise every care in digging, stacking and picking. One reason why some people never get the highest market price for the crops produced by them, is that they fail to give proper care to the harvesting. It is poor farming to raise a good crop of anything and then let same be improperly handled. This is very true of tobacco. Many farmers produce fine crops in the field but on the salesroom floor, they present a poor appearance. So with peanuts. They may be of the finest quality and production, but careless handling will lessen their value greatly. The weather has much to do with the crop, but that has to be met in everything. Careful handling and stacking will make good stock for the picker. And here comes a great difficulty. So many people neglect to properly cull the nuts even when picked by hand. When a machine is used, great care should be taken to keep them clear of sticks, trash, etc. Clean nuts of good quality are always desired by the buyers. Some farmers have a desire to rush things to market, and so fail to give proper care to their products. The farmers of the county should derive every benefit from the crops raised in this and in every succeeding year.

**A Call to Teachers**

The great majority of the school teachers of North Carolina, practically the entire body of teachers of the State, favor the election of Woodrow Wilson to the presidency. He is a great educator as well as a great statesman, and his election is one which can well bring joy to the hearts of all the teachers.
