S. A. Newell And Family Leave

The New Year will bring a personal loss to Williamston in the removal of S. Atwood Newell and family to Louisburg, Franklin County. Mr. Newell came here immediately after obtaining license to practice law in September 1903. He received the A. B. degree at Wake Forest in May of the same year. He associated himself with his brother, the late Geo. W. Newell, and upon the death of the latter assumed the entire practice of the firm. Several years after making his residence here, he wedded Miss Nell V. Simpson and purchased a comfortable home on Simmons Avenue, where with the two interesting children, they kept open house to their friends and neighbors.

Mr. Newell is a native of Franklin County and has responded at last to "the call of the blood" to come back home. He will practice law there. Since coming to Williamston, he has stood for the material, social and religious uplift of the town and county. No enterprise has been started here that did not receive his hearty cooperation. He was secretary of the Chamber of Commerce and exerted every effort to advance the prosperity of the community. In the fight for civic righteousness, he was always found in the forefront. He has been superintendent of the Baptist Sunday School for years, and has done much to bring the school to its high standard.

Mr. Newell has sold all his property here and will build an attractive residence in Louisburg. Friends in Williamston and in the county regret his decision to locate elsewhere, feeling that a valuable citizen is leaving for in the practice of law and in all business transactions, he has proven to be a man of the highest integrity and one who carefully looked after the interest of his clients.
