Notice of Primary Election

MARTIN COUNTY—NORTH CAROLINA.

As required by An Act of the General Assembly of 1913, providing for Primary Elections in Martin County, notice is hereby given that a Primary of the Democratic Party will be held at the various polling places in said County, hereinafter named, on Thursday, the 6th, day of August, 1914, for the purpose of nominating candidates for the House of Representatives and all County and Township Officers. Polls will be opened at sunrise and close at sunset. Registration Books shall be kept open ten days immediately preceding day of Election for the registration of new Electors; and said Books shall close at 8 o'clock on the night preceding such Primary Election. It is suggested that the two Townships, heretofore nominating a County Commissioner, vote for one Commissioner. Copies of said Primary Law will be printed in due time and distributed to all the Registrars and Judges of Election.
