TEACHERS' SALARY SCALE IS INJURIOUS

The public schools of Martin county having the largest attendance in the state and the schools of the whole state are having the largest attendance in the state. The wages were so high that the children left the schools and were so high that teachers were not justified in teaching at the salary paid them.

But the hard times have sent the children back to the schools and now the salary scale for teachers has been so changed that only college graduates or those teachers having had college training can afford to teach by the salary scale, and some of the public schools are closed today on account of the shortage of teachers.

The new rule is fine in theory but poor in practice. It makes little difference how much real ability one has. It may have come from a long period of practical study and work, it counts little. Young girls and boys who have done a certain number of hours work at a few certain schools and attended a summer school or two are the only ones who can command a fair salary.

Commissioners Have Special Session About Road Building

The Board of County Commissioners met November 30th for the consideration of the Beaufort, Halifax lines road proposition.

The Board decided to put off the cost of the road from the bridge to the Beaufort county line, the work to begin as soon as possible and practicable. But petitions were heard from various citizens in the Hamilton section against any road construction.

For that reason the county-seat to county-seat project was not passed upon but the Board will take it up at its regular meeting next Monday.

There are many things that are inexplicable but one of the strangest is why an intelligent being will curse and curse against good roads. It has been proven centuries ago that good roads pay and the theory has never been disproven. Yet there are some who are always opposed to any improvement in the roads unless they can be their own.
