## TEACHERS' SALARY SCALE IS INJURIOUS Personal Mention

The public schools of Martin county having the largest attendance in the and the schools of the whole state are ristory of the county and state. The var almost prostrated the whole schol system. Wages were so high that the hildren left the schools and

vere so high that teachers were no justified in teaching at the salarie paid them.

But the hard times have sent the mildren back to the schools and now the salary scale for teachers has been so changed that only college graduates or those teachers having had colley training can afford to teach by the salary scale, and some of the public scools are closed today on account of the shortage of teachers. The new rule is fine in theory

oor in practice. It makes little difference how much real ability one has It may have come from a long perio of practical study and work, it counts but little. Young girls and boys who have done a certain number of hourwork at a few certain schools and at tended a summer school or two wie the only ones who can command fair salary.

This rating puts some teachers, who are young, inexperienced and have very little experience and knowledge in schools at very good salarie while others who have had some train ing and have a vast store of practical experience and knowledge are unagle to command a salary large enough up

Legislation of some kind is neede o change this law so that it will not be so severe that it will harm and hinder the educational system of the
