VEHICLES MUST STOP AT GRADE CROSSINGS

NEW GRADE CROSSING LAW BE **COMES EFFECTIVE IN THIS** STATE ON JULY FIRST

Atlantic Coast Line rail road company calls attention to the fact that new grade crossing law becom effective in this state on Ju y 1. This law requires that no person operating motor vehicle upon a public road ass, or attempt to cross, any railroad or interurban track intersec ting the road at grade, excepting on ly electric railroad tracks in a city town or village, and other tracks at which there is a gate or watchman a the crossing.

Atlantic Coast Line rail road com pany has placed new signs require the law on both sides of each ch public road grade crossings on its 1161 miles of track in North Caro lina. Approximately 1,500 signs have been placed.

The new signs consist of a white board 40 x 50 inches, 10 feet from the ground, on which is painted the words: "N. C. Law-Stop."

There is also painted on these board a cross, to attract the attention o. ching motorists. The signs are approa located 100 feet from the neares track.

It is hoped that a sound publi sentiment will support this new lay and its observance. Accidents to moto vehicles at rail road grade crossing: have increased in the country at large nearly 50 per cent since 1917, ac cording to figures compiled by the Interstate Commerce Commission, In 1917 there were 2,076 accident i which 1,083 persons were killed and 5,000 injured. IIn 1921 there were 2, 940 accidents, in which 1,259 people were killed and 3,976 injured. IIn the first nine months of 1922, 2.221 acci dents have been reported, in which 978 people were killed and 3,011 were injured. In the week ending Juve 2 1923, there were 35 fata' accidents of this character, responsible for the death of 55 persons

All intelligent people konw and all omest' people will admit that the several farmers' marketing associions operating in this section are composed of farmers, as good as the average, men who do the real proincing, and men who poined because they had not had a fair deal in the race of life, men who knew then and know now that they had a perfect right to organize for their comm

This organization of farmers all tand on exactly the same footing. Every member has exactly the same right. A farmer who raises 1000 bales of cotton and a farmer raising one hale, each has one vote. Every member of the association votes for his choice for a heard of directors. After their directors are elected, of course, they handle the association's business, and are accountable to their people for their stuartship.
