Do the Hard Suraced Roads Pay?

Do the hard surfaced roads pay? It is a question of sufficient importance to receive the most careful investigation.

It is almost a universal opinion that there is a wide margin between the cost of a road and the value it adds to the property it serves.

The cost of hard surfaced roads is about \$20,000 per mile, which is an increase of 50 per cent over the cost of a dirt road. The value added to the property is about \$10,000 per mile, which is a 50 per cent increase over the value of a dirt road.

A test shows that 800 cubic feet of soil over each mile of the Williamston-Washington road each day which is 200,000 cubic feet of a dirt road, and a quarter cent per ton per mile of vehicle, on the hard surfaced road, and estimated to be \$10,000.

A citizen living five miles from his home, will travel the more proper route, and the cost of the road will be the paying of the difference in road for the purpose of a dirt road and a concrete road. When traffic increases the cost per mile will increase in the proportion of 100 to 1.

Campaign Wins New Members

During July, 172 persons qualified for the official emblem of recognition issued by the United States Department of Agriculture to persons who are just bred sires exclusively for a class of animals kept. The work is conducted jointly by the various states and by the department. The total number of persons participating in the end of July was 11,000.

The department is now distributing a lithographed sign, "Pure Bred Sires Exclusively Used on This Farm," to the stock owners who enroll in the letter block campaign and who request the sign. Each sign issued bears a number which identifies the live stock owner with the nation wide movement for live stock improvement.

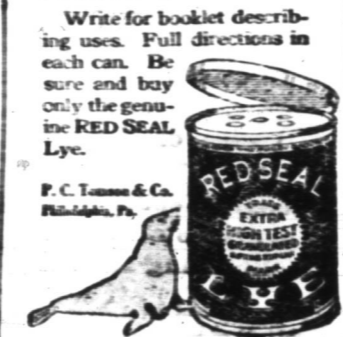

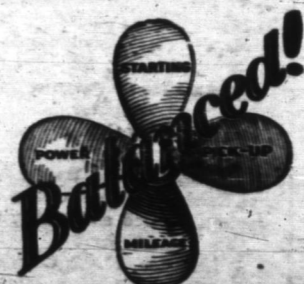
