"Centrifugal" Car Wheels.
Of the steel car wheels on the market probably the most novel, says the Scientific American, is the one known as the Davis wheel, which is cast steel of special composition. The wheel is cast in a mold that is placed on a revolving table. The molten steel is poured into the center edge of the mold, where it cools first, thus forming the tread of the wheel. As the pouring starts ferromanganese is forced into the molten metal; and as the rim of the mold fills up the jet of manganese is gradually reduced so that the central part of the wheel is plain carbon steel.
