THE MATERIAL in this issue of Public Welfare Progress is taken from the Biennial Report of the State Board of Charities and Public Welfare for 1922-24, which will appear soon.

Among the outstanding acitivities of the board during this period have been the Mothers' Aid Work, through which 260 women and 1,000 children are now being helped; the census and clinics for crippled children whereby 700 crippled children were discovered in the State and 495 examined at 9 clinics.

The increase of the number of individual cases handled by the board from 215 in 1920-22 to 759 in 1922-24 shows that the people of the State are learn ing to apply to the S ate board for he p in solving their sec al problems, and is an indication of the growth of the board's work

The study of public-poor relief in North Carolina, the results of which will be published in detail in a special bulletin, gives interesting and valuable da's on the care of the indigent in this State. Statistics on the population of county jails and chain-gangs have been collected, and though not com plete, throw considerable light on the problem of the State's criminal popu-

The central registration of inmates of child-caring institutions has been effected during the last biennial period and a study of the population of the es in this State and of three State institutions for children.
