

FINISH SURVEY OF NON-UTILIZED WOOD IN STATE

Wood Wasted Annually Would Load 33,000 Railroad Cars

According to a recent survey, 33,000 railroad cars, or a train 265 miles long, could be filled with wood which now goes to waste annually in the sawmills and wood-working plants in North Carolina. In the form of lumber, this material would represent the production from about 113,000 acres of standing timber and would build nearly 50,000 average small dwellings.

This fact was determined in a survey conducted in North Carolina by a sub-committee of the National Committee on Wood Utilization, in cooperation with the North Carolina Department of Conservation and Development under the honorary chairmanship of the Governor of North Carolina and having Reuben B. Robertson, of Canton, as its chairman. After 10 months work the survey has just been completed, and the results are published in a bulletin, "Survey of Non-Utilized Wood in North Carolina."

Non-utilized wood will furnish raw material for pulp mills, fiber board plants, box factories, and similar industries and may be used in the manufacture of small dimension stock, charcoal, and distillation products, lath, excelsior, and other materials. The bulletin describes these methods of utilization.

The report includes suggestions for the elimination of waste and for utilizing wood that is now wasted. An appendix includes charts and tables showing the quantity, kind, and species of non-utilized material reported by the State and by each county. The name and address of each firm that reported non-utilized wood is listed, together with the quantity, kind and species available at each mill. A large map folder shows the distribution of hardwood and softwood waste by counties and gives the location of the firms which have reported non-utilized wood. The map also shows the highways, rail ways, and navigable waterways.

The bulletin may be obtained at a cost of 20 cents from the Norfolk District Office of the Department of Commerce located at 406 E. Plume Street. In quantities the bulletin sells for \$15 a hundred or \$120 a thousand.

AMPLE SAFETY IN WHIPPET BRAKES

New Bendix Development is Effective in Making Quick Stops

A braking system on four wheels that assures the maximum of protection and safety for quick stops has been built into both the Whippet four- and six-cylinder cars, according to engineers of the Willys-Overland Company, who considered ample braking power equally as vital as quick acceleration in these cars.

In the case of the Whippet Six, a two-shoe brake which is the latest Bendix development is used and gives a much better braking condition than even that which prevailed in the previous model, the engineers say. This, of course, was particularly necessary in view of the increase in weight of the car, it was pointed out.

Investigations conducted by insurance men and traffic experts interested

have revealed that the biggest cause of accidents in many cities is lack of quick braking power in automobiles. This is frequently due, of course, to neglect of the brakes through failure to have them tightened up or adjusted. Most accidents happen, it was found, at street intersections where automobiles frequently collide when the drivers find themselves powerless to stop their cars within short distances.

The braking system in the Whippets has been tested under all kinds of conditions and the distances measured to make certain that they could be brought to an immediate stop. Other tests were made to determine the rate of deceleration to find how rapidly the braking power of a throttled-down motor is effective in stopping the Whippets with the use of the brakes from various speeds.

In fact, the engineers point out that braking power is one of the most important elements in the riding comfort of a car, along with sufficient springing and ease of steering.

Field Work in Soil Survey Of Two Counties Finished

Washington, Sept. 16.—Congressman Lindsay Warren has been advised by the Department of Agriculture that the field work in the soil surveys of Martin and Gates Counties has been completed, but the reports and maps are not yet available, there being considerable work done on them before they are ready for the Public Printer. Shortly after he entered Congress, Mr. Warren made a special appeal for soil surveys of these two counties, and when they become available will mail them out to interested citizens.

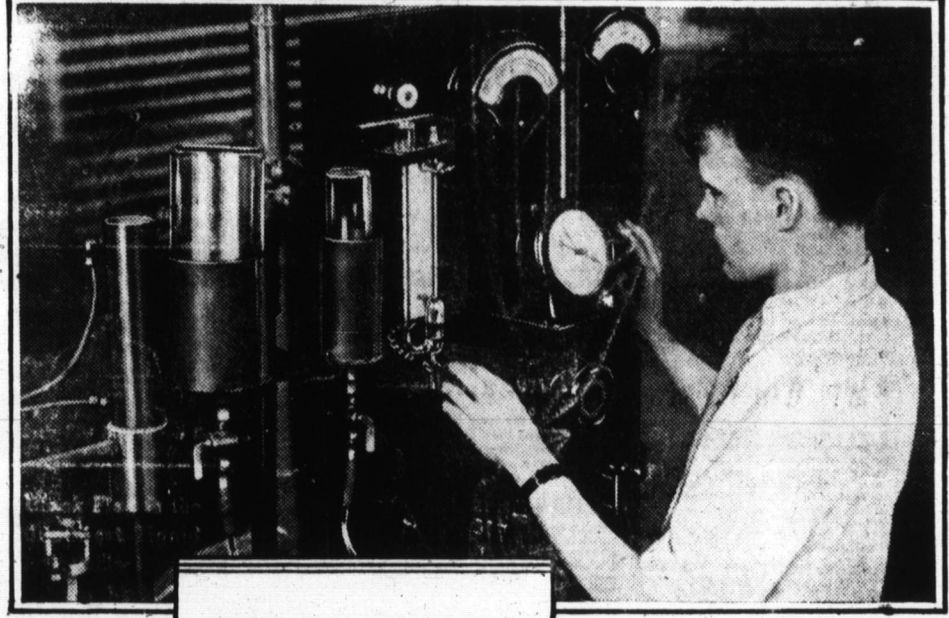
