When eggs were 3 dozen for 25c. Putter, 10c a pound; Milk was 5c a quart; the butcher gave away liver and treated the kids with BOLOGNA. The hired girl received two dollars a week and did the washing. Women did not powder and paint (in public), smoke, vote, play poker, or shade the SHIMMIE.

Men wore whiskers and boots, chewed tobacco, spit on the sidewalks and cussed. BEER was 5c, and the lunch was free. Laborers worked ten hours a day and never went on strikes. No tips were given to waiters, and the hair check graft was unknown. A kerazene hanging lamp and a stereoscope in the parlor were luxuries.
