HEAVY PENALTY PROVIDED FOR COTTON FRAUD

Illegal To Use Cotton Tax Exemption Certificates for Personal Profit

Any person using cotton tax exemption certificates to defraud the department of internal revenue will be liable to heavy penalties.

Dean L. O. Schaub, of State College, issued this warning to persons buying seed cotton from farmers, charging the farmers the 5.66-cent tax, and then buying certificates to exempt the cotton from tax.

This practice is being followed by some ginners in order to make an extra profit of 1.66 a pound off the farmers, according to reports reaching the college. Certificates sell at the rate of four cents a pound.

Only Producers May Buy

The dean pointed out that only actual cotton producers may legally buy extra tax-exemption certificates. If a producer sells seed cotton without certificates, then he must pay the tax.

If the buyer deducts the amount of the Bankhead tax from the purchase price, then he must pay the tax when the cotton is ginned. Or if the cotton changes hands several times before going to the gin, each successive owner must pass the tax on until the cotton is ginned.

The ginner must collect the tax and turn it over to the department of revenue, Schaub said, for the tax becomes effective the minute the producer sells the seed cotton without an exemption certificate.

Everetts Man Befuddled After Short Stay in Jail
