Limestone Needed Where Soil Is Acid
Recent farm management demonstrations throughout the Piedmont and mountain sections of North Carolina indicate that it is absolutely necessary to have ground limestone applied to the permanent pasture for the grasses and clovers to make best growth. This same thing must be true also in eastern Carolina particularly where the soil is acid. North Carolina farmers have never used enough limestone generally on their fields devoted to the growth of legumes, grasses, forage crops, and the like.
