

### Increase In Electric Refrigerators Seen

Proving that Americans look upon electric refrigeration as a year round necessity, a total of more than 105,000 domestic electric refrigerators was sold during the month of January of this year.

Oklahoma led all states in the percentages of sales increase of domestic electric refrigerators for the first month of this year over January of a year ago. Other leading states in sales percentage increases included Oregon, Louisiana, Arizona, Minnesota and Washington, and the District of Columbia, according to B. S. Courtney, local dealer for General Electric home appliances.
