John Youngblood, president of the Tarboro club, wrote to Ray Goodmon in which he apologized for the outburst, that caused William Rhinehardt, a Williamston player, to have three stitches taken in his head.

Yesterday, Tarboro people went by hundreds to the Williamston park, to show their friends in Martin county that they were sorry, and were anxious to bind friendly ties, which were stretched by the incident to the point of breaking.

Ray Goodmon has been a good friend to Tarboro, and Tarboro in turn has been good friends with Williamstor. We regret the incident, and hope that it is not too late to clear up the uncalled for example of poor sportsmanship on the part of a Tarboro would-be sport and fan.

We feel sorry for any man who cannot control his temper or his reason, to the point where he must grab a bottle, and using it as a club sneak up from behind and crash the bottle into the back of the head of an unsuspecting person, particularly, when that person has his hands full fighting others on equal footing. Particular-Ty also when that person is a guest of your baseball club, which is your city and your county.

The man is known and the police can do nothing less than arrest him, for if they fail to do so they are as guilty to such a terrible act as they


