HINTS FOR HOMEMAKERS

MEATLESS MAIN DISHES FOR LENT

Egg-Asparagus
1 can asparagus, or
1 lb. fresh asparagus, cook paprika
6 eggs
1-2 cup grated cheese
Line the bottom of a greased, rectangular baking dish with asparagus. Break the eggs over the asparagus, being careful to keep the yolks whole. Sprinkle with grated cheese and paprika. A few strips of pimento may be added to give color. Temperature 375°; baking time, 15 minutes.

Pink Bunny
Melt 2 tbsp. butter. Add 2 tbsp. flour that have been mixed with 1-2 tsp. dry mustard, 1-2 tsp. salt, and 1-4 tsp. pepper. When blended add 3-4 cup milk and 3-4 cup tomato soup that has had 1-8 tsp. soda added to it. Stir in 1 cup of cheese that has been cut fine. When melted add 2 beaten eggs and cook until thick. Serve hot on Uneda crackers.

Fish Souffle
2 tbsp. butter
2 tbsp. flour
1-2 tsp. pepper
1 1-2 cups milk
1 tsp. salt
1 tsp. minced parsley
1 large can fish flakes, or salmon
1 tsp. grated onion
3 eggs
Make a white sauce of the fat, flour, pepper and salt. Add to this the onions, parsley, and fish flakes, the latter picked apart with a fork. Beat egg yolks until light, then add to this mixture. Fold in stiffly-beaten egg whites. Pile in buttered casserole. Temperature 350°-375°; baking time 45 to 60 minutes.

Creamed Tuna
Melt 4 tbsp. butter, add 4 tbsp. flour and blend. Stir in two cups milk and cook until thick, season with 1-2 tsp. salt and 1-4 tsp. pepper. Add 1 can tuna fish that has been broken not too small Add 1 cup of green peas and 1 tsp. pimento if desired. Serve hot on toast or Uneda crackers.

Seafood a la Newburg (Serves 6-8)
1-4 cup butter.
5 tbsp. flour
2 1-2 cups milk
3 egg yolks
Salt and pepper
1 tsp. sherry, if desired
Melt butter, add flour and cream. Cook on low heat on surface unit until thick. Add 2 cups of mixed seafoods (shrimp, lobster or crabmeat). Add egg yolks and sherry and heat slightly again on low heat. Pour mixture into baking shells or in well-greased baking pan. Sprinkle top with butter and bread crumbs. Bake in a cold or preheated oven. Temperature 375°; time 45 minutes.

Cheese Souffle With Mushroom Sauce
4 tbsp. butter
8 tbsp. flour
1 tsp. salt
Few grains Cayenne pepper
2 cups milk
1-2 cup grated New York cheese
Yolks of 3 eggs
Whites of 3 eggs
Melt butter, on low or quarter heat, add flour and add gradually the heated milk. Follow with salt, pepper, cheese and egg yolks. Beat whites dry and stiff and fold into mixture. Turn into buttered casserole. Place in cold or preheated oven. Temperature 300°; time 45 minutes.


