Urge Vacationists To Use Precaution

Expressing no desire to excite the people or cause undue alarm, Dr. Carl V. Reynolds, State Health officer for North Carolina, this week warned vacationists to exercise due precaution in planning their trips. His statement follows:

"In view of the extended business and official holiday leave which this year will be observed in connection with the Fourth of July, and because of hundreds of inquiries I have received from North Carolina—and throughout the country, I feel it my official duty at this time to urge our people to refrain from planning to go or to carry their children into sections where there is an unusual incidence of infantile paralysis.

"The purpose of this appeal is not to ask the people to shun any one section in preference to another, but to avoid unnecessary exposure by not going into a section where there is a known prevalence of infantile paralysis.

"I am sure that upon careful reflection anyone will realize that there are many resorts free from suspicions of infantile paralysis and that such resorts will be selected in preference to those that may be questionable from the standpoint of presence of this disease.

"In other words, why sell your birthright for a mess of pottage? At the same time, I am convinced that those who live in areas where the incidence of infantile paralysis is above normal are doing uninfected sections an injustice to go into them, and it is hoped that, during this season, persons from such areas will not, in order to shun danger at home come to North Carolina resorts. Let it be remembered also that there are some who, although they do not develop infantile paralysis in its active stages, serve as carriers—as in the case of typhoid fever and diphtheria—and that these may communicate the disease in its virulent form to others; to those, perhaps, who may become incapacitated for life, as the result."

"This is an appeal for the self-preservation of our people who are urged to stop, look and listen."

Good News Prevails In Business World

Good news prevails over the bad in domestic business. With the two mid-summer months just around the corner, manufacturing and mining industries are showing an improvement unusual for this time of year. Reflecting this steady output of raw materials and merchandise, rail carloadings rose a bit more last week. An upturn in business in England and France promises renewed export demand for American automobiles.

No seasonal decline is evident in the shoe industry. May output was 32,000,000 pairs. With abatement of fears over federal competition, a number of utility companies are planning expansion programs to cope with rising power usage which promises to reach a new peak in 1940. This should create a great deal of employment. The only really disturbing news comes from the Far East. Japan now controls the entire Chinese coast, seriously threatening established British and American rights there. Business, which is just getting over European war scares, may get the jitters all over again as a result of this new turn in the Sino-

FREE Protection Against Typhoid Fever & Diphtheria
AT THE PLACES AND ON THE DATES MENTIONED BELOW

Typhoid fever is gradually being reduced, but there must be no let-up in vaccination. Now is the time to protect yourself against it. There is no excuse for even a case of typhoid fever when perfect immunization for two years may be obtained through attendance at the clinics scheduled below. Three injections at weekly intervals are necessary for complete protection.

It is the duty of every intelligent citizen to become inoculated against all preventable diseases, especially Typhoid Fever and Diphtheria — for their own protection and that of their neighbors. It is also their duty to do all in their power to persuade others to take preventive measures. Typhoid Fever, being frequently fatal, is a useless economic waste, as it is so easily preventable.

Diphtheria can be prevented by taking Toxoid—one dose now, and another in two months. The law requires all children under 5 years and over six months of age to have this protection against Diphtheria. They cannot enter school without it.
