Helpful Information About When To Seed Alfalfa

Enos Blair, State College extension agronomist, says experiments have shown that fall seeding of alfalfa is usually more satisfactory in the Piedmont and Coastal Plain sections, as well as in the lower elevations of the mountain region. One great advantage of seeding in the fall is that the young alfalfa plants will not have to compete with weed and grass. By the time spring arrives, they will be large enough to withstand the invasion. When seeded in the lower elevations of the mountain region, alfalfa should be put in between now and August 15, with 15-day intervals between that and the seeding dates for Upper Piedmont and the lower Piedmont and Coastal Plain.
