

### Lupton Will Direct Census In District

Representative Lindsay Warren stated today that he had recommended the appointment of Mr. D. W. Lupton, of Pantego, as director of the census in the first district, and Mr. W. A. Everett, of Edenton, as assistant director. Both men are now attending a census school in Raleigh.

Mr. Lupton had charge of the business and agricultural census in 1934 and 1935. Mr. Everett is a prominent business man of Edenton.

All other positions in connection with the census will be enumerated. No information has yet been received as to how many enumerators will be allotted to each county. The business census will be taken in January and the population and farm census in April and enumerators will work for about thirty days.

Mr. Warren stated that all enumerators would be appointed by Mr. Lupton after they had passed a test prescribed by the bureau of the census. He further stated that he had turned over to Mr. Lupton all letters written to him on the subject and has advised parties to communicate about the matter with Mr. Lupton.

#### Was Native of Robersonville For More Than Seventy Years

Funeral services were held here in the Baptist church Monday afternoon at two o'clock. The last rites were conducted by Rev. E. C. Shoe and Rev. B. B. Fordham, Baptist minister of Farmville. Interment was in the local cemetery.

The deceased is survived by two daughters, Mrs. Gus Roebuck, of Farmville; Mrs. T. Grimes, of Miami, Fla.; two sons, Cecil L. Everett, of Hot Springs, Ark., and Norman R. Everett, of Richmond, Va.

### U. S. Marine Corps Seeks Enlistments

Captain John M. Greer, officer in charge of Marine Corps recruiting activities for North Carolina, with district headquarters in Raleigh, announces that a large number of young men are to be accepted for service in the Marine Corps during the month of December. Men accepted are sent to the Marine Barracks at Parris Island, S.
