

### Poe Offers Seven-Point Program As Political Feeler

are blowing.

His "seven-point" program follows:

"Whether as governor or as a private citizen, I expect to devote the next five years of my life chiefly to a program for the enrichment of North Carolina. In selecting either a governor or members of the legislature the seven unescapable facts in which every man or woman should be interested are these:

"1. North Carolina is a poor state.

"2. It ought not to be a poor state.

"3. We have plenty of natural resources to make it a rich state.

"4. Our people have plenty of ability, energy and character to make it a richer state.

"5. We also have plenty of institutions, agencies and organizations to make it a rich state—if we could be united in one forward movement.

"6. To mobilize all North Carolina for this purpose is the present supreme need—to forget for four years the factions and schisms that so easily beset us and get all our people to work as hard and enthusiastically for enriching North Carolina as they usually work for some favorite candidate as nominee. Thus we might crowd into four years all the progress of 20 to 40 ordinary years in making North Carolina a rich state—rich not only in increased farm wealth, but in increased labor income, in increased industrial income, in increased intellectual and

### Interesting Bits Of Agricultural News

**Spreads**  
 In the two years since the first soil conservation district was organized by farmers under state law, erosion control in districts has spread over more than 7,000 farms, embracing 2,000,000 acres.

**Feed**  
 Supplies of feed grains available for the 1939-40 feeding season are now estimated at 110,000,000 tons, reports the U. S. Bureau of Agricultural Economics.

**Improving**  
 After running behind the preceding year every month since late in 1937, sales of farm implements began to record improvement in July, and August, and have made sharp gains in the past three months.

**Syrup**  
 Experiments have shown that syrup prepared from sweet potato starch is comparable in appearance and flavor to cornstarch syrup prepared under similar conditions.

**More Lean**  
 As a result of consumer demand, experiments are underway in several sections of the United States to meat in the bacon.
