Milk cows are to carry a value of \$50 against \$30 last year. Beef cattle are to be listed at four cents instead of three cents.

New tractors are to be valued at \$100 less purchase price. Old tractors will be placed on the books at \$100 less for the first year and graduated down.

Automobiles will be listed strictly in accordance with the Blue Book prices. Merchandise stocks will be figured at 60 per cent of their inventory value with stocks and fixtures carrying a tax value of 40 per cent of their purchase price.

Withholding any definite prediction as to the trend of the total assessed values this year, Tax Supervisor S. H. Grimes stated this week that he saw no reason why there should not be an increase this year over last.

Particular attention is directed to the farm census survey. Every farmer is asked to list his acreages planted to various crops last season and have ready other detailed information for the list-takers.
