EASTER DESSERTS AND DECORATIONS

Everyone seems to be on the quest for new desserts and entertainment ideas. Modern taste has changed even in the business of party giving, and the alert hostess takes advantage of this craving for the new by planning her party menus just a bit different. With the assistance of the modern range, entertaining is simplified and becomes a delightful experience.

Ever since eggs were accepted as the symbol of life they have been "Eggsactly" right. The breakfast egg alone does not make our Eastertide. There must be some kind of special dessert. Easter ends Lent and the sweet tooth must be satisfied. The refrigerator renders possible easy making of many delicious and nourishing frozen desserts. The strawberry ice cream which is suggested here will give you a smooth rich-flavored ice cream.

Strawberry Ice Cream

- 2 cups strawberries
- 1-4 cup sugar
- 2 eggs
- 6 tbsps sugar
- 1 cup coffee cream

Crush strawberries through potato ricer and add 1-4 cup sugar. Beat egg whites until light, then beat in two tablespoons of sugar. Beat yolks with the rest of sugar and corn syrup until very thick. Stir berries into egg yolks and cream into the whites. Finally fold both together. Freeze with temperature control turned to coldest position until half frozen. Beat until smooth and continue freezing. When hard, reset temperature control to normal position.

Criss Cross Date Pie

- 1-1/2 tbsps tapioca
- 2 cups dates (halved)
- 1-4 tsp salt
- 1-1/2 cups boiling water
- 2-1/2 tbsps butter
- 2 tbsps brown sugar
- 3 tbsps lemon juice
- 1 recipe pastry

Add minute tapioca, dates and salt to boiling water and cook for 2 minutes. Remove from heat and add butter, sugar, lemon juice and let stand until cool or while pastry is being made. Line a 9 inch pie plate with one half of pastry, rolled to 1-8 inch thickness. Fill with date mixture and arrange lattice of pastry strips across the top. Bake in a hot oven (425°) 10 minutes, then decrease to moderate oven (350°) and bake 25 minutes longer. Cool. Arrange whipped cream around edge crust just before serving.

Orange Layer Cake

- 2-1/2 cups cake flour
- 4 tbsps baking powder
- 1-4 tsp salt
- 2-3 cup butter
- 1-1/2 cups sugar
- 3 eggs
- 3 tbsps grated orange rind (1 large orange)
- 2 tbsps lemon juice
- 5 tbsps orange juice
- 2 tbsps water

Sift flour, measure and sift twice with baking powder and salt. Cream butter and sugar until very light and beat in the eggs one at a time. Mix in the orange rind, then add dry ingredients and liquid alternately. When thoroughly blended, pour into two lightly oiled and floured 9-inch layer pans. Bake in a moderate oven (375°) 35 to 40 minutes. Use recipe orange frosting for filling and icing.

Orange Frosting

- 2 tbsps butter
- 2 egg yolks
- 2-3 cups confectioners sugar
- 2 tbsps grated orange rind
- 2 tbsps orange juice
- 2 tbsps lemon juice

Cream butter and combine with thoroughly beaten egg yolks. Beat in 1 cup of the sugar, then add the grated rind and juices. Work in remaining sugar until very smooth and of the consistency to spread.

Easter Cakes

Individual cakes may be frosted with thick white icing and covered with cocoanut colored with green vegetable coloring with a few drops of water. Candy Easter eggs or an Easter Bunny may be placed in the center of the nest of cocoanut which will delight the children.
