## Sewing Contests Poplar Features For Cotton Week

### Plan Helps To Boost Sales of Cotton Fabrics, National Council Says

Greenville, S. C. — As a part of specially planned National Cotton Week activity, cities over the Cotton Belt are staging sewing contests for high school and college students, the National Cotton Council announces. Under sponsorship of leading department stores, the contests have the requirement that all garments entered be made of cotton. Selection of winners is made at a special cotton style show.

The Council credits the origin of the plan to merchants of Greenville and Spartanburg, S. C., where an Inter-City Sewing Contest was held last year. Final selection of the Carolina winners this year was made at Greenville, S. C., where plans were discussed to enlarge the contest into a statewide affair.

Sales of cotton goods in cities where the contests are held have been greatly stimulated, the Council said. At one Greenville department store cotton fabric sales are 53 per cent over the same period last year.

Nationwide interest has been attracted by the Greenville-Spartanburg contests, with representatives of leading publications and firms attending the events and offering special awards to the winners. The 1940 grand prize winner is to be given a trip to the Memphis Cotton Carnival.
