Beer Industry Will Continue Clean Up Drive

The beer industry's "clean up" campaign in North Carolina entered upon its second year this month, Edgar H. Bain of Goldsboro, state director of the Brewers and N. C. Beer Distributors committee, is in charge of the campaign which has as its purpose the elimination of a law-violating beer retailers.



Organized one year ago, the committee has inspected 727 outlets in 73 counties, warned 113 dealers to correct certain unsatisfactory conditions and secured the revocation of the retail beer licenses of 78 dealers in 30 counties. In addition, four dealers were placed on probation by local authorities upon petition of the committee. Bain said today that the campaign against undesirable outlets will be pressed during the next 12 months.
