In the planning of the hors d'oeuvres tray, as in planning the dinner menus, contrast in flavor, color and consistency are important factors. The variety may be large or small. If the hostess is alone in preparing and serving she will do well to specialize in two or three appetizers, making them especially savory. If she has plenty of time and assistance, too, she may like a

more elaborate service.
The following suggestions are of a varied nature. Some are for tooth-pick appetizers, others for canapes and still others for supper snacks that will be nice to serve for porch suppers and the like.

Hors d'Oeuvres Suggestions On a platter or small tray arrange a border of large perfect strawberries and tips of fresh pineapple. Pile powdered sugar in the center. Serve

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
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
