THE EYE EATS FIRST



Stimulating dishes are the order of the day. The eye "eats" first, and those of us whose responsibility it is to feed the family have long realized the necessity of serving food that urges the appetite just in looking at it. The idea of garnishing food is not new, but the garnishes—like the best menus, become drab and uninteresting and lose their value when they follow a pattern.

For Soups
Sprinkle a few grains of puffed wheat or puffed rice in clear or cream soup.

For Salads, Sandwiches and Meats
Cube or cut apples in rings, roll in paprika, minced parsley or chives. Hollow out the centers of pickled beets—top with horse radish, relish or tartar sauce.

For Desserts
Toasted dry cereals sprinkled on puddings or ice creams.

For Beverages
Tint water in ice trays when partially frozen with vegetable coloring. Completely freeze then fill trays with water for fully volumed cubes.

For Trays
Place chopped fruit, berries or assorted fruit in each cube compartment of ice tray when partially frozen.

For Garnishes
Fill ice trays with strong tea, garnish with mint leaves when partially frozen.
