## LAST WOODEN COURTHOUSE TO FALL



Raleigh—The WPA will soon strike down what is definitely the "last wooden courthouse" in North Carolina. Graham County has applied for an \$87,750 brick, stone, steel and concrete temple to house its county officials, the courts and provide a section for those transgressors curtailed by justice from transgressing further. The project was approved by C. C. McGinnis, State WPA administrator, today. The papers are now on their routes in Washington for final determination there. To make way for the new building to be erected on the same elevated site, the endeavor calls for demolishing the old one, built in 1895. Like the old courthouse, the fire-proof structure, at Robbinsville, will be nearer the capitals of six other states than to its own at Raleigh.

## Rocket May Doom Warplanes
