Regardless of what is cooked be sure to make the fire long enough ahead to have just the coals for cooking—the flame will char your food and not get it done. Here are some of the things that each per son can cook for himself.

Small cube steaks are the best to

so you are not going to get burned during the operation. Cook it slowly over the coals. You might like it seasoned with butter and sliced on-
