HINTS FOR HOMEMAKERS

Let's have a steak roast! Now that the weather is crisp and the leaves are beginning to turn beautiful colors we think of a tramp in the woods ending with supper cooked over an open fire. Regardless of what is cooked be sure to make the fire long enough ahead to make the coals for cooking—the flame will char your food and not get it done. Here are some of the things that each person can cook for himself.

Steaks

Small cube steaks are the best to use as a steak sandwich—then you can have more than one. Have your cooking fork or stick long enough so you are not going to get burned during the operation. Cook it slowly over the coals. You might like it seasoned with butter and sliced onion after it goes on the roll.

Kabobs

(Veal, bacon, onion, tomato)

Have veal cut in pieces about the size of a silver dollar and one-quarter of an inch thick. Use about 2 to a serving, put on stick alternated with slice of onion, tomato and bacon. Broil slowly until browned to taste. Serve on rolls.

"Som'mos"

Graham crackers
Hershey's milk chocolate
Marshmallows
Toast marshmallows, put on Graham cracker with a piece of chocolate and top with another Graham cracker. It is surprising how many of these you can eat.

In case you want the food cooked together and then served, try

Hunters' Stew

2 cans spaghetti
2 cans green peas
1-2 lb. sliced bacon
2 medium onions
Salt and pepper

Use large skillet for whole amount or frying pan for bacon and then transfer to kettle. Cook bacon until brown and very crisp. Remove from pan and brown sliced onion. Chop bacon fine, return to pan and add other ingredients. Cook slowly until all is hot and seasoned with onion. This will serve 6.

Along with any of these main dishes be sure to have tomato juice, potato chips, pickle and plenty of good coffee.

Camp Coffee

Use good quality of coffee, ground coarse for "open pot". Then let the water come to a boil, pour in coffee and take the kettle off the fire, or put coffee in cold water and remove kettle from the fire as the coffee starts to boil. Approximately 1 cup of coffee to a gallon of water.

Maybe you had rather make barbecue at home in the electric roaster and take it to the spot, using the fire for coffee and good cheer.

1 lb. beef
1 lb. pork
1 No. 3 can tomatoes
2 bunches celery
1 onion
