'Bama-Tennessee Tilt Is Highlight in Southeastern Loop

Tide Leads Conference in Number of Wins; Vols Are Next

When Alabama meets Tennessee at Birmingham, October 19th, the Tide and the Vols will not only be battling for the leadership of the Southeastern Conference for the current season but will be fighting it out for the No. 1 rating since the conference was formed seven years ago, as well.

Since the 13 teams that make up the Southeastern Conference withdrew from the old Southern Conference at the end of the 1932 season, the Tide has compiled a won-lost percentage of .846 to second-place Tennessee's .762.

In the seven years of SEC competition, up until the start of the 1940 campaign, Alabama has lost but six games while winning 33 and tying four. Tennessee's record over the same span is 32 wins, 10 losses and two ties.

Tulane is third with 28 wins, 12 losses and four ties, while L. S. U. has won 26, lost 12 and tied two to earn the fourth spot.

Alabama lost three of its six games during the 1939 season. From 1933, the first year, through the 1938 campaign the Tide was defeated but three times by conference foes.

Alabama has been at the top throughout the seven years of SEC play, although Tennessee gained more than 100 points during its undefeated 1939 season.

Lee 4-H Girl Wins Canning Contest

Edna Earle Bowman, of Sanford, Route 1, in Lee County, was announced by Mrs. Cornelia C. Morris, extension food conservation and marketing specialist of State College, as the winner of the 1940 Ball 4-H Canning Contest. Edna will receive a cash prize of \$20.

Mrs. Morris was in charge of the State contest, in which the winning entries in county contests were displayed and judged at the N. C. State fair last week.

The other winners of cash prizes in the State contest were announced as follows: Myrtle Carter of Fayetteville, Route 2, in Cumberland County, second prize of \$15; Edith Shuping of Rowan County, third prize of \$10; Jean Inman of Westfield in Surry County, fourth prize of \$10; Elizabeth Crayton, of Stanfield, Route 1, in Stanly County, fifth prize of \$5; Helen Rierson, of Madison, Route 2, in Rockingham County, sixth prize of \$5; Lucille Gillette, of Silverdale in Onslow County, seventh prize of \$5; and E. Jay Cone, of Middlesex, Route 2, in Nash County, eighth prize, \$5.

Each entry consisted of two quart jars—one of fruit and one of vegetables. Mrs. Morris explained that the contest was restricted to girls enrolled in 4-H club work under the direction of a county home demonstration agent.

To be eligible for the State contest, at least ten girls must have competed in the county contest. The Ball Brothers company of Muncie, Ind., furnished the money for the prizes, but any make of canning jar could be used in the contest.

Wake Forest's Deacs And Marshall Clash Saturday Afternoon

Feud Between ohn Polanski And Marshall's Star, Hunt, Resumed

Wake Forest—Two great bruising football players will fight it out this week when Marshall College's Jackie Hunt and Wake Forest's Jolting John Polanski clash here in Groves Stadium. They'll be taking up where they left off in 1939.

These two boys put on a great grid show at Huntington last year with Polanski probably getting a slight edge in the argument, since the Deacons were able to win 14-13. However, the margin in Polanski's favor, if any, was meager and Hunt's performance for the Thundering Herd that day and throughout the season was nothing to be sneezed at. In fact in the Wake Forest game, it was far above that of any individual the Deacons faced in 1939, without doubt.

He completed five passes for 68 yards, one going for a touchdown and another setting up a six-point-er. His punt average against Wake soared to 44 yards per try on a wet field, and he gained 84 yards in 7 tries rushing for an average of 12 yards per play. He had one sprint of 44 yards from rushing to his credit.

Jolting John completed one pass in four attempts for 15 yards to John Jett during the first touchdown drive and he gained 118 yards rushing. He carried 24 times. Possibly Hunt's paper record is more impressive than Polanski's, but the pile-driving John connected on his tries more consistently when they meant points. Polanski scored one touchdown from the 11-yard line.

The two boys were sophomores last year, now they're juniors. Marshall and Wake Forest are not scheduled to meet again in 1941, so this will have to be the deciding game, as far as their personal feud is concerned. Hunt stands 6 feet 2 inches and weighs 200. Polanski stands 6 feet 3 inches and weighs 210.
