Raleigh — In the distribution of \$16,370,462.19 to unemployed and partially unemployed workers of North Carolina in the 33 months of benefit payments through September, the 46 white employment offices and 10 colored branches distributed 2.505,147 checks. Chairman tributed 2,595,147 checks, Chairman Charles G. Powell, of the State Unmployment Compensation Commis ion, states.

This distribution included 30,516 checks for \$325,473.68 going to out-of-state workers who had previous-ly established wage credits by work

During the month of September, 1940, the distribution of jobless benefits amounted to \$413,506.75, included in 79,795 checks, of which 2,211 checks for \$19,551.36 went to out-of-state claimants with wage credits in North Carolina.
