the meantime, the draft board is to attend an instructional school, the date and place to be determined. Between October 26 and November 2, the first drawing or lottery will take place in Washington. Questionnaires will be sent to those whose names are drawn in Washington. Classification work will be started just as soon as the questionnaires have been out five days. As rapidly as the classification work is completed, those men falling into the No. 1 group will be directed to report to Dr. J. S. Rhodes in Williamston for a physical examination. Possibly the first group to be selected will leave on or about November 18th. The schedule for handling the draft has been delayed, and definite dates for the national lottery and other events are not known at this time.

It is estimated that one out of every forty of those registering Wednesday will be called into the service within the next four weeks. An additional eighty will be called between that time and next June.

Members of the board received their official appointments today, and will take their oaths of office as soon as possible. Next Tuesday they will attend a training school in Edenton at 10:30 o'clock.

Volunteers Aid In Draft Registration

Expressing a willingness to do their bit for their county and serving without remuneration or hope of direct reward, many volunteers reported at the various precincts in this county Wednesday and aided in registering 3,228 men. Long delays were reported in some counties, but in Martin the work was handled with dispatch, and business and industry were not greatly inconvenienced. The tobacco market closed and the tobacco plant of Skinner and Company suspended operations, but the work schedule for general business was maintained without great interruption.

Seek To Increase Tobacco Parity To Twenty-Two Cents

Proposal Is Now Before Congress for Consideration At Present Session

Washington — Tobacco Congressmen from North Carolina, Virginia and Kentucky have joined in a concerted effort to secure enactment of the Flannagan bill to increase the parity paid on tobacco from 18 to 22 cents.

Following the meeting in the office of Senator Josiah W. Bailey, hope was expressed that a plan to attach the bill to a "rider" would meet with success.

Both Senator Bailey and Senator Harry F. Byrd, of Virginia, pledged their cooperation in seeking Senate action on the measure that has been fruitlessly waiting House approval for some time.

Representatives Cooley, of North Carolina, John W. Flannagan and Thomas G. Burch, of Virginia; Virgil Chapman of Kentucky, and J. B. Hutson, assistant AAA administrator, called on Bailey and Byrd to launch the move in the Senate that might prove a short cut to final enactment of the important tobacco measure.

The plan is to have the Flannagan bill included in a bill already passed by the House and now before the Senate. If the Senate would agree to keeping the amendment in the bill, it would then go before joint House-Senate conferees and thus avoid submitting the proposal to a test of the House. It was agreed that time is too short to hope for favorable House action.

Held for Threats



Lincoln de Cleve, 22, has been held in \$10,000 bail for the Federal Grand Jury, in Philadelphia, on charges of threatening to kill President Roosevelt. According to government authorities, De Cleve has been making threats against the President since 1936.

Unemployed Paid \$6,187.00 Recently

Raleigh — In the distribution of \$16,370,462.19 to unemployed and partially unemployed workers of North Carolina in the 33 months of benefit payments through September, the 46 white employment offices and 10 colored branches distributed 2,595,147 checks, Chairman Charles G. Powell, of the State Unemployment Compensation Commission, states.

This distribution included 30,516 checks for \$325,473.68 going to out-of-state workers who had previously established wage credits by work in North Carolina.

During the month of September, 1940, the distribution of jobless benefits amounted to \$413,506.75, included in 79,795 checks, of which 2,211 checks for \$19,551.36 went to out-of-state claimants with wage credits in North Carolina.

The Williamston employment office distributed \$182,160.85 embraced in 32,027 checks in the 33 months of payments in the area served by the office, through September. In the month of September, this office distributed 1,386 checks for \$6,187.55 to the unemployed in the area.
